I appreciated the time you spent with me and John Pond from CES last month exploring the shoreline along the GAC property.

We concluded our meeting with agreeing that I would get back to you in 30 days to share

with you my thoughts, ideas and potential action plans on the items we discussed.

Ceramic debris

I agree that the scattered ceramic debris along the shoreline is not visually appealing. My understanding is this was put there years before GAC acquired the property. While inert and not an environmental threat to the bay, it would be better if these items could be removed. We have made good progress to date removing these items from the cove. I am hopeful this project will conclude by the end of August.

#### **Erosion**

I think there may be a workable solution to stabilize the open area we viewed along the bank near our rail car unloading station. We have asked CES to help us review our options and assess the cost of each. Our plan is to attempt a section of the area this fall and evaluate

how it fares over the winter and early spring months. If successful, we would plan to complete the remaining open area in 2013. If not successful, consider one of the other options offered by CES.

#### Clam Flats

I have not completely formed an opinion on the condition of the clam flats. You have provided me with many documents to review and understand. I would like to take a few more weeks to complete my review.

These additional weeks will also allow us to make more progress on the options for the erosion matter. Let's set our calendars ahead to the week of September 10. This will get us past the busy vacation month of August and the Labor Day holiday.

Finally, you asked if GAC would be willing to participate

in a "coalition" of sorts for Penobscot Bay. I remain open to this idea. We can discuss this idea further as you consider others for this group.

I received your voicemail message from Monday afternoon sharing your interest in GAC's shoreline. Over the past 9 months we have had our shoreline reviewed and/or inspected by seven representatives from the Maine DEP and licensed professionals from an environmental consulting firm hired by GAC.

It was determined that the erosion along our shoreline is

not significant and does not require immediate attention. It is also not something that is caused by or exacerbated by GAC. Nonetheless, I committed to you and Harlan McLaughlin last year that GAC would investigate your concern with erosion and we have done SO.

With the understanding that GAC is under no obligation to perform any additional inspections or alterations to this particular area, GAC is

voluntarily exploring options and alternatives with an environmental consulting firm. When dealing with shoreline matters, this is a process that takes time, effort and money. At this point I do not have a specific time table for action because we are in the early stages of our exploratory efforts. We will continue those efforts in a deliberate manner.

Hi Susanne.
I believe that you were going to send me a note summarizing our May 16th meeting and the way to more forward concerning the eroding wastes of Kidder Point. I think you said

1. Ownership GAC Chemical owns the

intertidal flats out to the low tide line, as described in its deed

2. Uncontrolled Hazardous Waste. At our meeting Jana observed that the situation along the southern site of the peninsula fits the definition of an uncontrolled hazardous waste site -well documented sulfuric acid spills leaching their way through mixed already highly acidic fertilizer and alum production industry wastes, mixed with demolition

debris from discontinued processes onsite. As DEP records show the waste is deposited atop a layer of marine clay and travels by surface aquifer down into the beach sediments and intertidal flats. We consider that this site fits the definition of an "uncontrolled hazardous waste site". I recall that Jana Wood concurred with that. Do you concur in this? If not, why not?

3. Jurisdiction The town of Searsport has primary

jurisdiction over this dumping of wastes into the intertidal flats, rather than DEP. This pursuant to 12 MRSA 573. Public trust rights in intertidal land, which gives municipalities the police power to bar "the depositing of any refuse or waste on intertidal land or in the water covering intertidal land;" I understand that the addition of "recreation" to public trust rights of fishing fowling & navigation, as asserted by this law, has been struck down by the Maine

Supreme judicial court (the addition of "recreation" to the fishing fowling & navigation public trust rights is what the Court had disagreement with.

David Colter and a new GAC erosion control initiative. We contacted David following our meeting. His reply repeats the promises made (and broken) in the past, but continues to shy away from any date certain for any erosion control work. and from consideration of the content of the wastes eroding

off the company site as anything but the bland nondefinition term "fill". We get the sense once again that paying to repair the health of the harbor from the impact of this industrial runoff is quite secondary to GAC's profitmaking priorities. We note with disappointment a continued assertion by GAC that MDEP supports inaction on controlling and remediating these hazardous wastes, and is comfortable with guessing that things are probably OK,

hence shouldn't be looked into too closely. Do you agree with that anti-precautionary policy?

Susanne I look forward to your responses on the above but also your meeting notes, so that we are on the same page, and can resolve some murky bits of unclarity.
